Do frogs lay eggs?

Yes! Frogs lay eggs, but not the same way that birds do. Frog eggs do not have shells. The female lays thousands of them in a big jelly mass to keep them from drying out.

Soon the froglet grows front legs. The lungs begin to develop and its eyes and mouth grow bigger.

Eggs hatch into tiny tadpoles: fish-like creatures that breathe through gills instead of lungs. Tadpoles use their tails to swim.

> When the tail disappears the froglet becomes a frog. It can jump and swim! Now, it will live both in and out of water.

The tadpole grows legs, and it is now called a froglet. As it grows, its tail keeps shrinking.
